Now I am enjoying simple and basic QSO with slow speed. My current goal is to chat with CW in Japanese (wabun) and English.

I am suffered from many noises around my home shack in Tokyo, So I often go to shack in Tochigi and Chiba prefecture. I am active on  $1.8 \sim 50$  MHz bands now.

The photograph is a scene when we changed the antennas in September. I climbed up the tower after a long time. Now I found the most important thing is to reduce my heavy weight as soon as possible. Hi.

#### BUSHCRAFT HAM RADIO – KENJI, YD3KNJ, #15269

My name is Kenji, and I am Indonesian. I live in Sidoarjo, East Java Indonesia. This small town is near Surabava. I am a new ham, I passed the exam of ORARI this year in March. But I became fascinated with Morse from the very beginning. Since I haven't taken the exam I had started listen to Morse code on my cellphone. I started sending CW on the bands in real QSO was on August 28, 2018. So yes, I am a novice and eager to learn and practice more. Besides my fascination in CW, I also love operate in QRP, 5 watts max for CW and 10 watts max for SSB. I don't have a home base station antenna, the reason is I still live in a rent house, apart from the condition of the house is not possible to install a home base antenna. I also don't have any certainty until when I can live in that house before I have to move out. So ORP is best operated outdoor and portable, this suits me well. This way I have unlimited possibility of setting up my antenna, I can pick any location I like, whether it is in a field near my house or in the mountain.

My other hobby also supports this kind of setup. I love



being outdoor. I love camping, bushcrafting, practicing archery outdoor etc. So I will be able to enjoy my other activities while operating portable ORP CW.

My radio is mcHF SDR QRP Transceiver and my antenna is simple wire end fed antenna or vertical antenna. The vertical antenna is the same wire I use for end fed, I just wind the wire to an 8 meter fishing pole to make it vertical, and erect it on the ground. Sometimes I use simple wire Inverted Vee. Currently I am building my own homebrew that I bought as a kit, it's OCX ORP Transceiver for 40 m band. But I still have problems with Tx and Rx, please note, during my life I never learn electronic, so this is my first experience following the instructions on the OCX assembly manual to exactly build something. But I enjoyed it.

I really want to participate in the EA Fists Net on Sunday morning, but most of the time I have difficulty listening to the freq due to propagation and ORM. However, I am very open and willing to have an appointment for CW OSO with anyone of you. I have successfully made contact with Nao san, JO3HPM FISTS#15008 on 15 m band. My class is only allowed to operate on 80, 40, 15 and 10 m bands. If anyone of you is interested in making appointment with me, please do not hesitate to contact me via email: <u>sekiguchi.kenji@gmail.com</u> but please make sure that the date of QRV must be made few days before, because I will have to setup my antenna to the best location possible.

I also make video log for my QSOs regularly, so the chance is you will be recorded if you make QSO with me. My YouTube channel is Bushcraft Ham Radio.

In order to demonstrate the fun of CW communication, we held an event named "Challenge! Solid Copy" in this year. (Many thanks to JH1JDI/Mai for planning.) Participants of this event had to hear 50 randomly-generated CW characters in a desired speed and type of code of his/her preference either in alphabet (QOD1) or Japanese (QOD6), and hand-write received characters. Scores were calculated accordingly by the number of correctly received characters and the speed, then results were posted in our booth.



This event had drown attention and we had many participants, including YL's and college students. Because tickets for students under 22 and ladies were free this year, it seemed we could find more students and YL hams than usual year.

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On the first day night, some of the FEA members went to Akihabara and held a drinking meeting and had a good time. Ham Fair 2019 will be held August 31 and September 1. We are looking forward to meeting you all again next year!





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## SPECIAL TOPIC: HOW TO KEEP MY ACTIVITY

## **SUGI, JK7UST, #7178**

I like QSO with home brew rigs. It is "how to keep my activity". I made HT-1A on this summer vacation. (<u>http://www.geocities.jp/mx6s/ht1a.html</u>) I chose semi-finished product kit, so it looks like MIZUHO's P-7DX. There is an assembly manual with pictures, so it's not too difficult to assemble while watching it. Chip parts are already soldered.

I report the feeling of HT-1A. I feel that it is the DDS version of K1 of Elecraft. Without RF amp, the signal goes directly into the SA602 mixer. And it has the AF AGC. You can hear the 1  $\mu$ V signal clearly on 7 MHz or 14 MHz. However, in little noise QTH, you will want a preamplifier on 14 MHz. The received sound is mild by the 3 pole filter. Although you will have QRM in the contest, it will be suitable for everyday use. I usually hear



CW sound from the speakers, but HT-1A has no speaker. So I added an audio amplifier. The filter band is variable so that you can listen to the SSB. Frequency step can be changed by clicking the tuning knob, which is useful when watching the band.

The first QSO was with a Hungarian station on 14 MHz. After that, I worked 6 EU stations and Azerbaijan station in an hour. It seems to be a good condition, so I was very lucky.

# HOW TO KEEP MY ACTIVITY - TAK, JS1QIZ, #15150

I do not know if I can call myself an "active" ham. Number of QSO per year is about 100 to 150, and the number has not changed very much for these 25 years or so.

The reason I have not disappeared from the band is that I could find "something new" for these years.

I spent my first eight ham-years as a contester at university club station in Sapporo. From 1991, the year I moved to Tokyo, I started to QRV on the 160 m on which very small numbers of the stations were on the air from Tokyo.

From 1993 or so, I was fascinated by QRPp QSO using P-7DX transceiver from Mizuho and made about 1000 QSOs with it. The notable thing is that many of the QSOs are rag-chewing either English or Japanese Morse code, thanks to the skilled operators copying my ultra low-level signals.

From the year 2000, I started to QRV on 144 MHz CW. This is because my wife recommended me to buy a new rig, IC706mk2G, which has 144 MHz in it. She was just surprised to see my careful "tuning" of the final tube-matching circuit in my old radio, TS530 and said I certainly need something a bit more up-to-date.

Using the new radio, I also re-started to join contests, which I had been heavily involved in my school days.

After that, I started out-door QRVs with a small MFJ CW radio and an FT-817. Around this time, I joined FISTS.

Two years ago, I started to QRV D-star and Wires-X VOIP radio systems, mainly from hotel rooms in my domestic and overseas trips. This brought me a small relief in the nights of my frequent travels.

Just one month ago, I (re)started to QRV on 1200 MHz, which gives me a new fun in calling CQs from top or high-floor of tall buildings.

Yes, these small challenges and small lucks have been enough for motivating me staying in the world of amateur radio. They are not necessarily related to CW, but keep activity in ham radio also means keep some activity in CW operation as well. When you find something new in ham radio, just get into it before thinking about if you are successful in it or not. This would, I think, at least keep you in maintaining a "minimum" level of activity.

## **RECOMMENDATION FOR SKED - MANABU, UK/JE1RZR, #15020**

Thanks to David, G3KMG, I manage to keep my motivation for CW till now. Every Sunday from 0845Z we have been continued a short SKED since 2015. The last poor propagation makes us not easy to contact each other but it's a great pleasure even to exchange a few word of greetings only. I think it's same to check in the NET on the air organized regularly as to make SKED for keeping your motivation. Good luck!
